Basket Weaving Workshop

Indigenous Weaving Workshop

Around 25 people sat in circle and learnt the art of Indigenous basket weaving at the Goongerah Community Hall recently, Participants from Goongerah, Deddick, Tubbut, Bendoc, Sardine Creek and Delegate watched carefully as local Gunai Elder Susan Martin and her daughter Kylie demonstrated the art of basket weaving. They weave local native grasses into an intricate pattern that will, in time, form a basket.

The Deddick Valley Isolated Community Group, with the assistance of Orbost Regional Health Outreach Mental Health Nurse, Birgit, was successful in receiving a grant from the Gippsland Primary Health Network One Good Community Wellbeing Grants Program last year as part of the communities self-directed Wild Fire Recovery. Orbost Regional Health also kindly supported the application with a letter and the grant allowed the workshop to be held at no cost to participants

Shelly McLaren from Goongerah was the successful applicant for the position of Recreational Assistant as part of the grant expenditure and organised the weaving workshop hoping to bring people from the different communities together.

The 2020 fires hit Goongerah very hard and Shelly said the people were still healing as the forest around them continued to regenerate. "Slowly we are coming out and gathering again," she explained. "Sitting around as a group learning this traditional skill from the Indigenous owners of this land was replenishing and a great way to heal.

Like the country here, we will never be the same but we will recoup and get stronger as a community."

Listening to the historical stories from Uncle Buzzy were also shared as part of the healing process. Shelly said participants were keen to have another weaving day and welcomed the idea of a healing ceremony with the Gunai Kurnai people.

"The best way forward after such an event as the 2020 fires is being together and sharing our different cultures," Shelly concluded.

ANZAC Day 2021

Important Update to ANZAC Day services.

Delegate RSL Sub Branch has been formally granted an Exemption (with conditions) from the NSW Covid 19 rules for ANZAC Day 2021 This means we can now hold a march.

Everyone who wishes to March has to provide their name and contact number to the Sub Branch prior to the march proceeding. If you do not provide these details you will not be allowed to march.

Members of the public who line the road to watch the march and service do not have to provide contact details but are asked to maintain Covid safe distancing.

We have approached the Council Traffic Committee for permission to hold a March and for a Road Closure to be granted but are still awaiting a reply from Council.


The marchers are requested to arrive at the Cenotaph at 10:30 with an aim to march off at 11am.

Bonang Post Office History

Post Offices in Gippsland – B **BONANG**

Post Office

24 km SW of Delegate N.S.W.

A loose-bag mail service was instituted from the beginning of July 1868, with the post office opening on 12th October 1874. The post office closed on 17th February 1998. A Community Postal Agency began operation sometime after that (date unknown) and has presumably since closed.

During October 1864 Government Geologists, Norman Taylor and Jacob Brache, met "...a settler named Marriott near Bonang where he had been prospecting all over the country". On 18th November 1866 the Marriotts began working the Rising Sun Mine "...totally ignorant of quartz reefing, and never saw a crushing machine at work. Relying, however on the richness of the stone, they constructed a very original plant, being a large wooden barrel fitted with several shafts, and worked directly by a water wheel. These shafts in revolving raise eight stamp heads, made from red gum and shod with iron; and without any ripple tables, with only a short box, they wash out regularly a yield of more than an ounce to the ton. By this method more than one half of the gold must escape, and with efficient machinery the yield would be double..."

Because of the difficulties getting to Bairnsdale, the Marriotts sold their gold to Bombala in N.S.W. There were about a dozen men working the Rising Sun, and there were other miners in the immediate vicinity – enough for the P.M.G. department to agree to a loose-bag service for the Bonang; the mail contract was operated by Henry St. John Law. Although no names are available, it appears certain that Robert Marriott (snr) was the person responsible for Bonang's mails during the loose-bag period. During August 1869, Robert Marriott and his sons – Thomas, James, William and Robert jnr – advertised their intent to obtain a mining lease for the Rising Sun which they had been working for nearly three years. At this stage there were 35 miners in the Bonang area. The residents of Bonang petitioned the P.M.G. department for a post office in May 1874, and Robert Marriott (Snr) was Bonang's first postmaster and received a £9 p.a. allowance. Over the 10-tear period Mr Marriott held the post office, the renumeration fell to £6, with only 1190 letters posted during 1884. Bonang was issued with Barred Numeral 854 when the office opened.

Victorian Post Office Directory 1888

During 1884, Robert Marriott Jnr held the post office in his Blacksmith forge for a couple of months before the post office was transferred to William Clancy's general store which had opened in the first months of the Rising Sun Mine's existence.

Clancy had been the second purchaser of land in the area during 1876, securing the land on which his store and house were located on the original track through to Bendoc. During 1888, William Clancy constructed a new home with the view to obtaining a Liquor License. In July of that year, he had been appointed as Collector of Imposts and, later, he was also appointed Electoral Registrar for the district. The additional duties to operating the post office led him to appoint a manager to his general store, while he constructed a purpose-built post office close to his Hotel. In April 1917, the telephone connection between Bonang and Delegate was completed, however the service only lasted a few months before being transferred to Bonang Lower, due to Mrs Clancy being unable or unwilling to manage the telephone switchboard.

Marion Legge also had to accept the post office duties when the P.M.G. decided to keep the postal and telephone services together, but this arrangement only lasted from July until August – when the post office and telephone service returned to Clancy's, and Miss J. Clancy was the switchboard operator. However, this arrangement didn't last very long; the post office and telephone took the trip south to Marion Legge once more during 1919 nearly two years before returning to William Clancy in March 1921. (NOTE: here, I believe [although there is nothing in John Waghorn's notes to confirm this] that William Clancy junior took over as postmaster.) At the end of 1926 William Clancy resigned as postmaster and the duties were transferred to Frederick Mead for nearly 12 months before Francis Reynolds attempted the job; he lasted less time than Mr Mead. At the beginning of December 1927, the Bonang post office returned to the Legge household. Robert Legge held the office of postmaster until his death toward the end of 1946. His

His widow, Marion, once again took over the duties of postmistress and switchboard operator.

Marion Legge notified the P.M.G. of her decision to retire at the end of June 1950, and the post office facility was transferred to Andrew Ingram during August. Mrs Legge stayed on as postmistress until the beginning of October to instruct Mr Ingram. In July 1953 Money Order facilities were made available through the office something the residents had been pushing for since 1939, Mr Ingram retained the post office until March 1962 when it was transferred to Margaret Mustard – who only served for 3 months before Betty Murray accepted the role. Mrs Murray was Bonang's postmistress until November 1970 and Geoffrey Drake took on the postal duties for 5 years before handing the baton to William Owen in November 1975. It was during Mr Drake's tenure that the manual telephone exchange was changed to R.A.X. (Rural Automatic Exchange). Five years later, Manfred Kleef became Bonang's postmaster on an allowance of \$2743 per year (double the allowance paid to Mrs Murray).


Toward the end of June 1984 Jane Dillon became Bonang's postmistress, and for the next 15 years the Bonang post office resided in the general store until it was destroyed by fire.

I, WILLIAM CLANCY of Bonang do hereby give notice that I desire to obtain and will at the sitting of the Licensing Court for the Licensing District of Bairns-dale to be helden at Bairnsdale on the 6th day of December next apply for a certificate authorising the issue of a Roadside License for premises situate at Bonang, containing six rooms explusive of those required for the use of my family and servants.

Dated this 24th day of December one thousand eight hundered and eighty-eight.

CHARLES S. ALEXANDER, Postmaster, Rokewood, to be a Collector of Imposts at Rokewood, for the purpose of collecting the fees payable on Miners' Rights and other Fixed Priced Licenses issued by him, vice Agnes White resigned;

WILLIAM CLANCY, Postmaster, Bonang, to be a Collector of Imposts at Bonang, for the purpose of collecting the fees payable on Miners' Rights.

Foot note: Rohan & Kylie Rhodes had purchased the Store/ Post office from the Dillon's and so they were the owners when it burnt down. (not sure on date). In 1996 Amanda & Royce Marion built Bonang Rural Services and Amanda took on the mail contract they operated until 2006, the area now has road side delivery from a contactor from Orbost.

Media Event in Orbost

On the 30th May two families from the North Riding were prosecuted at the Orbost courthouse for breaking the law. Their crime was that they built houses in breach of the Uniform Building Regulations of Victoria.

The first case heard by the magistrate was that of Richard and Debra Shill who provided their own defence. Richard's account

of their case follows -. 'We pleaded not guilty to all the charges on the grounds that we did not believe we had broken any law. We felt the law we had been charged with breaking was in fact immoral because it denies people their basic right to provide them selves with shelter from the cold. A right so basic I can't think of any other culture where such an irrational situation would occur. We also felt that we were not guilty because our being charged at all need not have happened. What better proof of being not guilty of an offence is there than to show that being there in court was not necessary. The council could have used its discretionary power and not forced the prosecution. It should not have been forced because through visits and letters from the relevant state government departments positive indications had been given to everybody that requests for temporary housing law reform were reasonable and were being looked at with a view to changing them , thereby hopefully dissolving the present ridiculous situation where people are harrassed by bureaucrats enforcing a mindless law and in some cases fined or gaoled and worst of all forced from the comfort of their homes into tents or caravans which are curiouslyquite legal!

Unfortunately the magistrate claimed that arguments such as the morality of the law were not matters for him to consider he was only concerned with whether the facts set out in the charges were proved. The magistrate interupted the defence case anumber of times claiming it was irrelevant.

Richard and Debra demonstrated great determination in pursuing their casewhich waseventually cut short by the magistrate who grew increasingly agitated. They were fined \$50 and \$40 each on two charges (2of the 4 charges were dropped in court by the prosecuting barrister) and ordered to pay \$150 costs each.

Sally Heslop appeared next before the court as legal owner of Sally and Jims' house.

They also had organised their own defence which Jim was all set to conduct when the magistrate informed them that only the defendant (Sally) or a barrister could present the case.

Sally pleaded not guilty and took control of the case but was hampered in the same way as Debra and Richard in that the magistrate claimed that she was not properly addressing the charges before the court and the question of morality of the law was a matter for the council and the state government not the court.

The charges against Sally were proven and she was fined \$30 on each of two charges. The magistrate decided that the professional costs for the prosecutor were to be born by the Council.


Alarge and enthusiastic public gallery offered support and encouragement to Richard ,Deb and Sally who did an excellent job in spite of their inexperience.

A large press contingent was also present for the cases including three T.V. crews. Lets hope the press coverage which was very sympathetic has roused public support for changes to one of the most unjust legal anomalies facing our community today.

News from the Department

Targeted planned burning program starting soon in Gippsland

This summer's devastating bushfires have had a significant impact across East Gippsland and it's important Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) continues to look forward to progressing further works to protect our communities and the environment across the region.

With current cooler conditions and suitable moisture levels FFMVic firefighters will start the autumn planned burning program in targeted locations across Gippsland in coming weeks.

FFMVic Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Beth Roberts said although the region is on the tail end of an enormous fire season in the east, FFMVic's community protection works must continue all year round, when it's safe to do so.

Bushfires starting in our landscape are inevitable, but we are implementing a variety of works to lessen the intensity and spread when they do, such as planned burning, building and maintaining strategic fire breaks, clearing, mowing and slashing,

We know the proven benefits of clearing fuel loads under controlled conditions, with previous planned burn sites slowing fire spread at a number of locations in East Gippsland this summer.

We'll be utilising the hundreds of skilled firefighters on deck this season to conduct the burns which are carried out under the current cooler, damper conditions to lessen the impact on the environment, when it's safe to do so.

In the west and central parts of the region our firefighters will be focusing on asset protection burns around towns including Mirboo North, Neerim, Erica, Yarram, Won Wron, Loch Sport, Heyfield, Coongulla, Briagolong, Glenaladale and Dargo.

Smoke from planned burns may cause concern for some people, so thank you for bearing with us while this important work is carried out.

The planned burn program is undertaken across public and private land with FFMVic working in partnership with CFA, local government and landholders, as well as the Bureau of Meteorology to assess weather conditions such as humidity, temperature and wind speed.

Recipes

Thai red curry chicken noodle soup

INGREDIENTS

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 garlic cloves, crushed

2cm piece fresh ginger, grated

1/2 cup Thai red curry paste

2 x 400ml cans coconut milk

3 cups Massel chicken style liquid stock

1 to 2 tablespoons fish sauce (optional

1 tablespoon chilli paste (optional)

300g fresh hokkien noodles

1 1/2 cups finely sliced red cabbage

1 carrot, cut into thin matchsticks

1 cup bean sprouts, trimmed

2 cups shredded cooked chicken

Thinly sliced small red chillies, to serve

Fresh coriander sprigs, to serve

METHOD

- Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Cook garlic and ginger, stirring, for 1 minute or until light golden. Add curry paste.
- Cook for 45 seconds. Stir in coconut milk and stock. Bring to a simmer. Reduce heat to low. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add the fish sauce and chilli paste to taste, if using.
- Divide noodles among serving bowls. Top with cabbage, carrot, sprouts and chicken. Ladle over soup. Top with fresh chilli and coriander. Serve immediately.

Chicken meatball soup

INGREDIENTS

extra small basil leaves to serve 500g chicken mince 1 eggwhite 5 garlic cloves, finely grated 2 onions, peeled, coarsely grated 2 tbs olive oil, plus extra to drizzle 2 x 400g cans crushed tomatoes 1L (4 cups) chicken stock Finely grated and shaved parmesan, to serve

METHOD

- To make the meatballs, whiz basil and parsley in a food processor until finely chopped. Add chicken, eggwhite, half the grated garlic and half the onion, and pulse until just combined. Leave mixture in bowl and chill until required.
- Place oil and remaining garlic and onion in a saucepan over high heat and cook, stirring, for 2 minutes or until onion begins to soften. Stir through tomatoes and stock, and remove from heat. Using a stick blender, whiz tomato mixture until smooth. Return pan to high heat.
- Meanwhile, with wet hands, roll tablespoon-sized balls of chicken mixture into meatballs and add to soup. With soup at a simmer, swirl pan, then cover and cook, carefully stirring twice, for 8 minutes or until meatballs are cooked through.
- Divide soup among bowls, scatter with parmesan and extra basil leaves, and drizzle with extra oil to serve.
