TRE

July 1979

Prompt action by Glenn Lemin and the Tubbut/Bonang C.F.A.
Unit averted what could have been a disaster at Lemin's house on Thursday evening, 8th June.

A fire started in the wall of the living room at about 8 p.m. It took Glenn some time to realise from where the roaring noise was coming, thinking at first it was the noise of the shower. It was not until he noticed smoke wisping over his shoulder that he realised the inside of the wall was on fire.

Within minutes the general alarm was raised. Glenn climbed into the ceiling, and with the aid of the house pressure system, was able to have pressured water onto the blaze immediately.

The response from the locals was tremendous, everyone arriving in record time, and I understand Teddy broke all records with the tanker.

Glenn thinks about \$1,000 of damage was done, but considering the possible results of such a fire if it had started when all the house hold was asleep, Lemin's had a very lucky escape.

STICKPICKING.

July 1979

would come and pick us up to

afternoon or morning tea.

In the year 1868 Hamilton Reed and John Lock, both of Sendoc, secured a grazing area of 60,000 acres at Goongerah. A suitable track had to be found to take cattle in, and as there were a lot of aboriginals about in those days who were acquainted with the country, they arranged with one named Little Billy to show them the best way in. He took them over the spur which was named after him - "Little Bill". The jungle was very dense from the top of the Bonang Mountain along the top of "Little Bill" and they decided on that route. The Bonang River was crossed two miles upstream from Mr. Russel's dairy farm (now Stan Bryant's). It took four men six weeks to cut a track in so that the cattle could be driven in to Goongerah. Young cattle were bought in Bega district and taken to the run where they did wonderfully well. At that time the hill country about Goongerah was fairly open forest with a good cover of grass. Bracken fern and scrub were dense along the river flats. Native bear, opossum and wallaby were numerous, kangaroos not so plentiful. Probably the dingoes which were in droves, kept the kangaroos down. They also killed the calves. On one occasion John Lock came on to eight dogs attacking a calf - the mother was trying to fight them off. Lock beat them off with his stockwhip, but the calf was so badly hurt it was unable to get up. He killed it and poisoned it, and next day there were eight dead dogs.

About the year 1872 horses were being impounded at Bombala in big numbers. Reed and Lock bought good brood mares from 1/- to 2/6 per head and took them to Goongerah for breeding purposes. Later yards were built in several places on the run to yard them for branding. There was a demand for Indian remounts, and the horses were mustered and those suitable taken to Bendoc for sale to a Victorian buyer. They were taken over the Snowy River, via Black Mountain, to Stratford.

In 1872 gold was discovered at 8.A. Creek six miles from Goongersh. There were a lot of men there, including Chinese, and the creek was worked for about four miles.

In 1876 John Lock went to Goongerah to muster cattle single handed. A bull charged and forced the horse against a tree and Lock's leg was broken. He rode to Bonang and then on to Bendoc before receiving any attention.

About 1878 Hamilton Reed and C.W. Nicholson decided to try to reach Orbost from Bendoc via Goongerah, a task they accomplished in four days from Goongerah. Dense scrub in places made it difficult to get through with packhorses. Selection of land at Orbost had commenced, and Hamilton Reed selected a block with the intention of settling there. Later he returned to build a residence at the highest position he had chosen previously only to find the flood water had been seven feet deep there. He decided to abandon the selection, and took up land at Goongerah instead. There was much pioneering work to be done - fencing.

clearing land for cultivation, buildings, etc. Farm implements had to be brought in on pack horses. Hay was grown for working horses, also maize for fattening pigs, which were killed and cured on the place, then taken to Delegate on pack horses and sold. Flour and sugar were brought back on the return trip.

In 1882 Mrs. Reed and family moved from Bendoc to Goongerah. It was camp life for a few months while a residence of five rooms was built. It was hard work getting timber from the forest for the building, but Mr. Reed was equal to any task he undertook. Hay barns and stables were built from round timber with stringy bark sides and roof. John Lock's interest in the grazing area terminated, and Read continued to hold the area. There was no mail service, and someone had to ride to Bonang once a week for mail. Wheat was grown, thrashed with a flail, and crushed with a steel mill by hand. Later a water race and wheel was established and two steel mills were put into service. This was a success - the only attention required was to fill the hoppers at an appointed time. With a fine sieve a good quality flour was obtained.

The Local Rag #3 June 1979

In 1887 Reed and sons and W. Clancy took the first mob of cattle from Goongerah to Orbost on the blazed trail that Reed and Nicholson had made in 1878. They were sold in the station yards, but they had to guarantee to cross them over the Snowy River before they were sold. James Cowell, Head Stockman at Orbost Station, and his men, came to the rescue and willingly gave their assistance. They were awum across the river just opposite the present G. & N. yards. At that time there was only a punt on the river to cross vehicles etc. to the other

A number of gold mines opened up in Bonang and Bendoc areas and Goongerah being the only settlement between Bonang and Orbost, everyone made there to stay. Reed was obliged to build more rooms to and Goongara, and Goongara to increase between Orbost and the above districts, and with Government grants of money some of the worst portions of track had side cuttings put in and rough culverts across the creeks. Coots and Herbert of Orbost had a string of packhorses to carry goods to Bonang and Bendoc. In 1889 J.J. Pleydall tothe first bullock dray through to Orbost. Then there was a twice-a-wask mail run between Orbost and Delegate by packhorse. The lats E. Foley of Swan Reach was the contractor. Gradually the road improved, and horse-drawn vehicles began to travel through.

Clearing the land at Goongerah was very difficult. The flats here heavily timbered - huge gum trees up to six feet in diameter at the butt, with large logs lying sodden on the ground. Many were buried in trenches deep enough for the plough to pass over. The timber was in a half-green state, making it hard to grub out and burn. It was expensive clearing - \$30 per acre. Each year a few acres were cleared and cropped. The ploughs in those days were not suitable for breaking up new pround.

When Mrs. Reed and family moved to Goongerah everything was taken by packhorses - furniture, ploughs, harrows - even a chaffcutter. Later others moved from Delegate to Orbost by packhorse, among them being W. Ross, J.J. Pleydell, Robert Crawford, and their families. Some of the younger children were transported on packhorses.

Hamilton Reed died at Goongerah in 1919 and was buried there. Later his wife was also buried there.

However if we leave the Running Creek bridge intact then the Valley is right for teachers as Tubbut is home to the full range - Kindergarten, Primary, Secondary, and even a University Professor.

Then there is an industrial chemist, a shearer, a mechanical engineer, a butcher and a concrete expert, and a good petrol supply and a beet crop, so even if we cannot grow sugar cane we'll have a sweetener. We've also another doctor and two librarians. Between us all we could rustle up a band or someone to play for our oners singer. We have a caterer and a farrier; and an artist to record events.

If things get us down we have two psychiatric nurses and if the worst comes to the worst we even have an undertaker to cater for our

News from the Shire

Releasing helium balloons into the environment is littering and illegal in Victoria.

Balloon releases and the law

From 1 July 2021, EPA will have increased powers to prevent harm to the environment from pollution and waste.

There are penalties for releasing balloons into the environment.

Under section 115 of the Environment Protection Act 2017, fines are:

up to six penalty units (\$991) for a person

up to 30 penalty units (\$4956) for a company.

For a series of balloon releases, and if taken to court, penalties are:

up to 100 penalty units (\$16,522) for a person

up to 500 penalty units (\$82,610) for a company.

If your activities, such as using helium balloons, pose a risk to the environment, you must take steps to minimise the risks.

How to manage risks to the environment from balloon use

EPA recommends that you don't use balloons outdoors. If using balloons is unavoidable make sure you strongly secure them. Make sure you correctly dispose of accessories like clips and ribbons.

Alternatives to balloons include:

blowing bubbles

floating flowers

reusable or recyclable bunting

paper decorations

planting a tree

Balloon litter and the environment

Wildlife can be seriously harmed or killed by balloons and their attachments. They can become entangled or ingest balloon litter.

Balloons floating in the water can look like squid or jellyfish. Marine mammals, sea birds and turtles often mistake them for food. In Victoria, seals and other animals have been known to become entangled in balloon ribbons which can cause lasting damage.

Zoos Victoria's campaign, when balloons fly, seabirds die, has more information about how you can take action.

Sustainability Victoria has more information about **preventing pollution from balloons**.

In 2019, the Australian Government started the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability which will go until 2023. This is known as the Disability Royal Commission or (DRC).

What is the DRC? A Royal Commission is a way the Australian Government can investigate the bigger issues.

The Disability Royal Commission is open to receive submissions and advice from people, including their families and carers who have experienced violence, abuse, neglect & or exploitation. By preparing and making a submission you will assist our government to get a better understanding of how people are treated and how this can impact community. The Commission are seeking people's recommendations.

With this understanding, the government can make changes to improve people's rights and reduce violence, abuse, neglect, and exploitation of people with disabilities.



- Ms Katherine Mullett, a proud Gurnaikurnai, Ngarigo Monero woman with a strong background in Culture Heritage Management and Land Management; and


Dr Tony Bartlett, who has experience working in Australian and international forestry.

Covid 19 Update and Assistance New support announced for Victorian businesses

The Victorian Government has announced further financial support for businesses that continue to be affected by the current COVID-19 lockdowns. The Victorian Government <u>has announced a \$400 million package</u>, jointly funded by the Commonwealth Government, that will provide automatic payments to almost 100,000 eligible businesses in Victoria, including sole traders.

Further hardship funds will be made available to eligible businesses that do not qualify for existing programs. The five key elements that make up the support package are outlined below.

Business Costs Assistance Program

Under the new State-Commonwealth business support package more than 90,000 businesses will be automatically paid a *Business Costs Assistance Program Round Three* grant of \$2,800.

Licensed Hospitality Venue Fund

New payments of \$5,000 to \$20,000 will be made to more than 8,900 hospitality venues across Victoria that received funding support from the *Licensed Hospitality Venue Fund* through the May/June and July lockdowns. Payments will be automatic and graded by venue capacity.

Alpine Business Support Program

Alpine businesses will receive between \$5,000 (off-mountain) and \$20,000 (employing businesses, on mountain) under an extension of the *Alpine Business Support Program*.

Small Business COVID Hardship Fund

An additional \$54 million will be added to the *Small Business COVID Hardship Fund*, allowing grants of up to \$8,000 to be paid to small businesses that are not eligible for support under existing programs and have experienced a 70 per cent reduction in turnover

COVID-19 Disaster Payments

Eligible workers who lose hours due to the lockdown will be eligible for support through the Commonwealth's *COVID-19 Disaster Payment*, as will businesses that do not qualify for Victorian Government support programs because they are not registered for GST. 

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

Recipes

Sicilian Cannoli with Ricotta Filling





Prep Time: 1 hour 30 minutes

Cook Time: 20 minutes

Servings: 24

FOR THE RICOTTA FILLING:

- □4 cups whole milk ricotta
- □3/4 cup powdered sugar or more if you prefer a sweeter filling
- dash of cinnamon
- □semi-sweet chocolate chips roughly chopped (optional)
- □chopped pistachios optional
- □ powdered sugar for sprinkling on top

To make the shells

Place flour in a large bowl. Make a well in the centre and add the egg, oil, sugar, red wine and milk. Stir the ingredients

Using a 4 inch diameter circular shaped bowl or cup, cut out rounds of dough with a knife. Once again, cover to keep from drying out the dough. When all the dough has been used up, wrap each round of dough around a bamboo dowel or stainless steel cannoli moulds and seal the edges with the beaten egg white.

Fill a deep pot half way with vegetable oil. When the oil is hot, fry 3 or 4 cannoli shells at a time until golden. You may have to hold them down to ensure that all sides are evenly fried. Transfer to a paper towel lined plate or tray. Carefully separate the cannoli moulds from the shell (be careful, they will be extremely hot!) and continue to fry the remaining rounds of dough.

For the filling

In a bowl, whisk together the ricotta, powdered sugar and cinnamon until smooth. Use a pastry bag or a plastic freezer bag with the tip cut off to pipe the ricotta filling inside the shells. If desired, dip the ends in chocolate chips or pistachios. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve.

Ideally, you prepare the shells ahead of time and then fill them just before serving or they will become soggy. The shells will keep well for weeks if stored in an air tight container in a cool dry space. If the brand of ricotta you use is very watery, place in a cheese cloth in a colander and let drain in the refrigerator for about an hour.
